Riversiders Win 62-mile pre-Olympics bicycle race

Mike Allan of the Riverside Bicycle Club was over-all winner of the 100 kilometer time-trial bike race around Lake Mathews yesterday afternoon with a time of 2 hours 40 minutes and 37 seconds. The course took finalist four-and a-half laps around the lake.

The world championship time for the 100 kilometer *62.5 mile) course is 2:05:51.

Riverside Bicycle Club placed first, and seventh over-all, with a

time of 2:56:35.

Second and third place B winners were Peter Pountney, San Diego, 10th over-all, 2:59:19, and Gene Webster, also of San Diego, 3:09:15. In C-class competition, Tio Lenzie, riding for the South Bay Wheelmen, placed first and fourth in over-all competition, with a time of 2:51:55.

Second and third places went to Jim Wright, of Riverside, who placed eighth over-all 2:58:35....

Dropped out after a lap and a half because of ill health due to the heat, as did Bill Harris of Beaumont. The high temperature yesterday afternoon in Riverside was 92.

The cyclist, racing against the clock, left a minute apart starting at 8 a.m. and ending around 11 a.m.

Although 15 of the 36 entrants in the time-trial had to drop from the race, leading race manager to plan further races at an earlier hour.
